Dedicated to the preservation of Glen Canyon's emerging cultural, biological, and scenic resources.

Water levels at Lake Powell reservoir have dropped to historic low levels, exposing spectacular and priceless features throughout Glen Canyon's 125 major side canyons. Low reservoir levels have provided the American public the opportunity to witness and study the unique cultural, biological, and scenic resources of this wild heart of the Colorado Plateau. As it now stands, precious features such as Cathedral in the Desert, Register Rock and Fort Moqui will go right back under 25-50 feet of water during May and June--only to be uncovered once again later this year. This fluctuation of water levels is unnecessary and destructive to emerging cultural, historical, and scenic sites in Glen Canyon.

The **Coalition for Glen Canyon** is dedicated to the preservation of Glen Canyon's emerging resources and will advocate for:

1. Protection of emerging resources from unnecessary fluctuation of water levels.
2. All surplus waters of the Colorado River to be stored at Lake Mead and/or in available upper basin reservoirs first. As water levels at Lake Powell drop, they should not be allowed to rise and further damage fragile emerging sacred and historical sites in Glen Canyon.
3. Upholding legal and administrative protections of priceless sacred sites and emerging endangered species habitat, and other resources.
4. Necessary and proper federal government oversight, funding, and protection of emerging resources from the impacts of visitors to Glen Canyon.

Glen Canyon Institute and the Coalition for Glen Canyon will work with the National Park Service to document and protect all emerging resources in Glen Canyon as legally required.
